Concept Note

I. BACKGROUND

Hospitality

Tourism is one of the leading sectors in our national economic development and prosperity. The increase of tourism destinations and investments leads to position this sector as a key factor in terms of export revenue and job creation.

Tourism has experienced an expansion that made it as one of the largest and fastest growing economic sectors in the world. Tourism Industry is the easiest and cheapest option to achieve GDP growth, generate foreign exchange earnings and increase employment rate.

ASEAN tourism showed significant progress. In terms of tourist arrivals, this region has sustained positive annual growth of more than 8 percent in the past 5 years. This leads to a creation of 32 million jobs in 2015.

The initiative to conduct this workshop is that tourism contributes ASEAN collaboration, since its impact will not only positively affect government and industry, but also its people and culture.

In terms of employment, the tourism sector plays an important role in facilitating various kinds of human capital. Within the business sector there are categories of labour: first is the skilled labour, second is the semi-skilled labour and third is the unskilled labour. In the tourism industry, the demand for skilled labour is the highest compared to semi-skilled and unskilled labour. Skilled labour in the tourism industry is required to provide service quality and hospitality to gain tourists' satisfaction.

ASEAN as one single destination with the single slogan, ASEAN feel the warmth need to face the challenges and the opportunities together with the same perspective and quality standard on human resources development through education. It is in line with the vision for ASEAN tourism over the next decade to 2025:

“By 2015 ASEAN will be a quality tourism destination offering a unique, diverse ASEAN experience, and will be committed to responsible, sustainable, inclusive and balanced tourism development, so as to contribute significantly to the socio-economic well-being of ASEAN people”

To work towards the vision for ASEAN tourism over the next decade related to the education, there is initiative as stated on the strategic direction number 1 of ASEAN Tourism Strategic Plan 2016-2025: To enhance the competitiveness of ASEAN as a single destination through the strategic action, raise capacity and capability of tourism human capital by continuing the implementation of the ASEAN mutual recognition arrangement on tourism professional (MRA-TP), preparing and implementing the ASEAN tourism human resources development plan in coordination with the ASEAN tourism resources management and development (ATRM).

Nursing (Health Care)

The face changes in the society and health care have presented many challenges for nursing. The challenge for nursing education is to ensure that professional education remains relevant and keeps in track with the needs of the market. These challenges include globalization, changes of patient characteristics, impacts of technology information, migration, future tendencies and other current issues in nursing development in Indonesia.

Indonesia's recent economic and political history has left a legacy of widespread poverty and serious health problems, and has contributed to marked inequalities in health care. One means of responding to these challenges has been through a reconsideration of the

professional roles of nurses, to enable them to deal with the range and complexity of health problems. However, there are currently a number of obstacles to achieving these aims: there is a serious shortfall in trained nurses; the majority of nurses have only limited education and preparation for the role; and there is no central registration of nurses, which means that it is impossible to regulate either the profession or the standards of care.

Creative Industry

The creative industries are some of the most dynamic and the fastest growing sectors in many economies, and the study of these industries affords insights for how we understand the current economic transformation towards knowledge-based economies more broadly. The transformation toward knowledge-based economies has been foreshadowed by the transformation of creative industries such as publishing, film, video, photography, music, etc. Certain sectors of the creative industries have evolved into experimenting sites for involving users and consumers in the development of new products, services and even new markets.

From a government perspective, the creative industries sector is attractive not only for the potential revenues it could generate, but also for providing an avenue for young people's entrepreneurship. Reflecting a common sentiment, former Minister of Tourism and Creative Industries, Mari Elka Pangestu, was quoted saying: *'Youths are highly influenced by the latest trends and global styles and are connected to social media'*. In her view, this makes young people the driving force behind the creative industries: *'They have the energy and creativity to develop local knowledge and traditions.'*

But despite the fashionable, stylish portrayal, youths who are interested in the creative industry still face problems similar to any other industry in Indonesia such as unevenly distributed transportation and communication infrastructure, bureaucratic inefficiency, and widespread problems of corruption.

As an industry that relies on the 'ideas and stock of knowledge of its human resources', creative industries are highly dependent on the skills and knowledge of educated and creative youth. In recent years, new departments in creative industries and design have been rapidly established in universities and vocational secondary schools of various reputes and credibility across the nation. These schools help to promote the idea of creative industry as a viable career option for youth and their parents. However, the realities in these schools often contrast with the glossy advertisements that promote these new study programmes. Except for a limited few, most schools and colleges are barely equipped and experience a lack of skilled teaching staff and facilities. Not many schools and colleges have up-to-date references or access to journals, while accessible public libraries, archives, or museums that introduce local arts, tradition and knowledge barely exist.

This workshop aims to strengthening tourism service quality within the region through improvement of tourism professionals' standard. Related to nursing, the workshop aims to establish the occupational profiles of each grade of nurse, identify their training and development needs and ascertain whether any differences existed between nurses working in different regions or within hospital or community settings. Related to creative industry, the workshop aims to boost the youth entrepreneurship equipped with the relevant curriculum, facilities, schools networking with creative companies and digitalization.

II. OVERALL OBJECTIVES OF THE WORKSHOP

- 1) To discuss on curriculum and skills development in the area of Hospitality (Tourism), Health Care (Nursing), and Creative Industry among TVET Institutions in Southeast Asia;
- 2) To promote qualified skilled-labours and TVET graduates in Hospitality (Tourism), Health Care (Nursing), and Creative Industry in Southeast Asia; and

- 3) To explore collaboration among TVET Institutions in Indonesian and other countries in Southeast Asia such as exchange programme.
